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

INTRODUCTION

Umeed Partnership Pakistan (UPP) is a non-political, non-profit organization registered under the Societies Act of 1860 with Registration No. 764, dated April 18, 2001, in Quetta. It is also registered with the Baluchistan Charities Registration and Regulation Authority, Government of Baluchistan, under Registration No. BCRA-114349, dated January 12, 2021. UPP received certification from the Pakistan Centre for Philanthropy (PCP) on April 29, 2021, under Certification No. PCP-2021/828.

UPP is a multi-faith, humanitarian organization committed to the development and promotion of human rights. It began its operations in the year 2000 in the tribal areas of Baluchistan, and its work has since expanded to Southern and Central Punjab.

Umeed Partnership exists to provide opportunities in education, vocational training, and human rights awareness to vulnerable and disadvantaged girls, women, transgender individuals, and street children in Punjab and Baluchistan. Over time, the organization has evolved into a comprehensive women's support body, extending its services to victims of abduction, rape, forced conversion, forced marriages, widowhood, disease, domestic violence, torture, human trafficking, forced labor, and marginalized transgender communities.

UPP primarily focuses on empowering women, street children, religious minorities, and transgender individuals through education, skills training, legal aid, direct assistance, and rights awareness programs. UPP envisions a society where women, girls, children, and transgender individuals achieve economic freedom and have the autonomy to make decisions about their own lives.

Across all districts, UPP operates adult literacy centers for illiterate women and girls, provides education to street children—especially girls—through its Umeed Schools, and offers human rights training to women, children, and transgender individuals. The organization also delivers legal aid and direct support to survivors of gender-based violence and exploitation, and facilitates the formation of interfaith peace committees among women. Furthermore, UPP conducts physical, psychological, and digital security training— particularly for women human rights defenders, survivors of violence, and staff of relevant organizations and institutions.

UPP actively promotes the rights of religious minorities and gender equality at all levels. It is deeply committed to the socio-economic upliftment and protection of human rights in Pakistan. Through its work, UPP seeks to dismantle unjust structures and empower communities. It operates at the grassroots level while also engaging with policymakers and partnering with all who are dedicated to human dignity and liberation.

A. FORMAL EDUCATION

UMEED MIDDLE SCHOOLS

In Pakistan, Umeed Partnership provides education at all levels, irrespective of caste, creed, or gender. The communities served by Umeed have some of the lowest education rates in the world. In urban areas, these communities live on the fringes and peripheries of cities, often forming impoverished slums. In rural areas, they reside outside main villages and towns, where there is no access to basic infrastructure or development. They lack schools, healthcare, sanitation facilities, roads, and opportunities for social interaction.

Umeed established two middle schools for Dalit and other highly disadvantaged communities in the Cholistan Desert, District Bahawalpur, Southern Punjab, Pakistan—an area with a 100% illiteracy rate at the time. In 2007, a middle school was opened for the community in Village 18/BC, Bahawalpur. In 2009, another middle school was opened for the community in Village 52/DB, Yazman.

Both schools continue to provide quality education to approximately 300 students, including both girls and boys. Umeed fully funds the day-to-day operations of these schools, as the students' families are unable to contribute financially to their education.

The graduation ceremony for the successful women students of the Adult Literacy Program (ALP), Session 13 (February to October 2023), was held in November 2023 at Chak No. 18/DNB, District Bahawalpur. A total of 220 women received their certificates.

The honorable guests, Mr. Nasir Justus, ALP Project In-Charge, and Mr. Yousuf Jalal Gill, Project Coordinator at UPP, graced the occasion. The entire community of Chak No. 18/DNB, along with residents from surrounding villages, participated in the program. It was a joyful occasion, and the attendees were delighted to be part of the celebration.

During 2023, UPP operated 80 Adult Literacy Centers across Punjab and Baluchistan, with each center enrolling 20 to 25 women students. The program consisted of nine months of training.







CERTIFICATE AWARDING CEREMONY QUETTA REGION

The graduation ceremony for the successful women students of the Adult Literacy Program (ALP), Session 13 (February to October 2023), was held in November 2023 in Quetta. A total of 210 women students received their certificates.

In 2023, UPP operated 80 Adult Literacy Centers across Punjab and Baluchistan, with 20 to 25 women participating in each center. The program spanned nine months of training.

Under the project title "Socio-Economic Empowerment of Displaced Women in Quetta, Baluchistan, Pakistan" a full day orientation and project briefing session was held for 30 teachers and trainers along with project staff on 27th October 2023 at auditorium Hall Jan Luxury hotel Quetta. The facilitators for the session were Shamin Gulzar Director UPP, Yousaf Gill project coordinator and Hamida Hazara project supervisor. The topic covered during the session were:

Skills and business development

Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA)

Secondary Traumatic Stress/Compassion

Secondary Trauma



2-DAY ADULT LITERACY TRAINING

Under the project titled "Socio-Economic Empowerment of Displaced Women in Quetta, Baluchistan, Pakistan," a 2-day Adult Literacy Training was held for teachers and supervisors on 28th–29th October 2023 at Umeed Partnership Pakistan's office in Quetta. The training facilitator was Shamin Gulzar, Director of UPP.

3-DAY TRAINING OF TRAINERS

Under the project titled "Socio-Economic Empowerment of Displaced Women in Quetta, Baluchistan, Pakistan," a 3-day Training of Trainers (ToT) was organized by UPP from 6–8 March 2024 in Quetta. The training aimed to build the capacity of 16 Women Human Rights Defenders (WHRDs) from 8 NGOs and organizations based in Quetta, equipping them to serve as facilitators and replicate the training with 705 women trainees across 30 skill training centres dedicated to Afghan and Hazara displaced women in the region.

The facilitators were trained to support the women trainees in developing and strengthening their vocational and business skills, with a focus on starting and managing small-scale enterprises. The training also aimed to equip women with managerial and productive skills to initiate or enhance home- and market-based businesses.

Key topics covered included:

- Who an entrepreneur is
- Why people go into business
- The key skills required to be a successful entrepreneur
- How to generate business ideas
- Common reasons businesses fail
- The basics of customer care

The second component of the training focused on psycho-social support, including self-care, well-being, mental health, and stress management skills.

The final session addressed Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA). During this session, participants engaged in open and meaningful discussions about their concerns and fears related to this critical issue. Their reflections provided valuable feedback for future interventions.









6 COMPUTERS TRAINING CENTRES

Under the project titled "Socio-Economic Empowerment of Displaced Women in Quetta, Baluchistan, Pakistan," six computer training centres are being operated for displaced women in various parts of Quetta. Each centre hosts 20 to 25 women and girls daily for three-hour sessions, except on Sundays. The centres are being conducted at the homes of the trainers. The training course has a duration of seven months and is funded by UN Women.



<u>6 CULTURAL SHOE AND DECORATION PIECES MAKING</u> TRAINING CENTRES



15 SESSIONS

In May 2024, a total of 15 sessions were facilitated by trained facilitators on economic empowerment, mental health, self-care, and well-being for 705 displaced women from 30 centres across Quetta. These centres include sewing, embroidery, traditional shoe-making and decorative crafts, computer training, and adult literacy centres.

The sessions aimed to equip participants with essential skills and knowledge to excel in business and entrepreneurship. Each session was attended by more than 40 participants and lasted over three hours, covering the following topics:

- Mental health and self-care
- Physical exercises
- Legal aspects of starting a business
- Customer care
- Entrepreneurship fundamentals
- Requirements for establishing, running, and growing a business
- Marketing strategies









<u>CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND INDUSTRIES (CC & I) QUETTA</u> <u>VISIT</u>

From 21–23 May 2024, a total of 360 women from various trades—including sewing, embroidery, and traditional shoe and decorative item making—visited the Chamber of Commerce and Industry (CC&I) Quetta over the course of three days in groups. Each group of trainees spent the entire day at the CC&I, from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., where they were warmly welcomed and facilitated by Mr. Aga Gul, Senior Assistant Director of CC&I; Ms. Mehvish Kenval Janjua, President of the Women Chamber of Commerce & Industry (WCC&I); Ms. Huma Baluch, Senior Vice President of WCC&I; and other CC&I staff members.

The CC&I administration was delighted and inspired to see such a large number of women entering the institution over three days. They shared that, in the history of CC&I, they had never seen so many women gathered there due to cultural, gender, and religious restrictions. However, they expressed great honor and pride in hosting the women and noted that registering such a significant number of women-led businesses in the near future would be a remarkable milestone for CC&I.



<u>MARKET VISITS</u>

From 06–13 June 2024, 360 women from various trades—such as sewing, embroidery, and traditional shoe and decorative item making (from 18 centres) visited various markets in Quetta in small groups. During these visits, they showcased their product samples to shopkeepers, who expressed interest and promised to place orders or purchase their finished products.
